3 MOST COMMON ROAD ACCIDENTS IN WINTER

1. Spin-out Collisions
2. Rear-end Collisions

4 WINTER ESSENTIALS TO PACK IN YOUR CAR

1. Warm clothing and blankets
2. First-Aid Kit
3. Flashlight and Matches
4. Non-perishable snacks

5 WINTER DRIVING TIPS

Avoid Cruise Control

Take control of your own speed and avoid skids by using manual driving controls.

Double Your Following Distance

Ensure that you have 5 to 6 seconds to make an immediate stop.

Be Cautious Around Snowplows

Never pass a plow on the right and maintain at least 200 feet distance from a moving snowplow.

Drive Slowly

Reduce your speed to maintain good traction and avoid skids.

Stay Home!

Minimize your risk of road accidents by staying put if possible.

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
